## **Clarification on Institute and Sessions**

Each student will be required to submit a short research narrative of 3000-4000 words by May 9th and complete all of the session readings in advance of the summer institute, which will begin on June 10th. Each faculty session is scheduled for approximately 2 hours and will be primarily lecture/seminar style. Students are expected to prepare a 10-15 minute presentation on their research, which will be followed by a group discussion of their work. The full list of confirmed faculty participants and the broad topics they have been asked to discuss is available below.

Once you submit your short research narrative it will be added to the PEP website and accessible using a password assigned to all participants. Faculty participants will be invited to review your narrative prior to the summer institute. Following the summer institute, one of our faculty members will be responsible for providing you with written feedback on your research narrative.
